What worked?

People loved the day – a great fit with the farm.

Positive feedback from performers & stallholders (all want to do another)

Hiring Village Hall & Car Parking.

Dog's allowed on half of the farm.

Refreshments area in village hall for those involved – a lot of positive feedback.

Having two tills.

The weather helped – it wasn't tipping it down as the previous day!

What didn't?

Not enough Car Parking! better placed signage relating to this.

Stallholders arriving - all on site at the same time – review.

Stewarding needs reviewing. Stewards that didn't turn up. Festival Committee became too involved in stewarding when needed elsewhere.

Children's area needs to be away from where animals poo!

Tranquil space needs to use further away Shepherd's hut for tranquility.

Better pre –info/signage relating to dogs.

For some – location of refreshments in village hall was too far away.

Issues-

Car parking

Concern by 1 member of public relating to Black faced Morris – need better advance interpretation relating to this tradition.

1 ticket refund relating to dog not being allowed on the entire site. Needed clearer advance advertising.

1 minor splinter injury attended to by St John's Ambulance.
